A CRASH COURSE ON ST. ANSELM

After joining the Benedictine order as a monk, St. Anselm became archbishop of Canterbury. Throughout his adult life, he sought to reform the church and monastery. St. Anselm, a medieval Italian thinker, offered compelling arguments for integrating faith and reason.

For example, his ontological argument for God's existence was a significant, though controversial, contribution that still impacts Christian apologetics today. He was also known for his rich devotional life; some of his prayers and meditations have been preserved in his writings.

WRITINGS OF ST. ANSELM

St. Anselm's two most important apologetics-related books are:

DISCOURSE
In *Proslogion* (Latin for *Discourse*), St. Anselm tackles the relationship between faith and reason and the arguments for the existence of God.

WHY THE GOD-MAN?
In *Cur Deus Homo* (Latin for *Why the God-Man?*), he explains and defends why Jesus must be both God and man in order to reconcile a holy God with sinful humanity.

BELIEFS OF ST. ANSELM

Faith and Reason
Anselm's approach to reflection begins in faith but achieves understanding through reason.

Ontological Argument
The biblical God is the greatest conceivable being and thus God's existence may be known through the reflection of God's perfect nature.

Satisfaction Theory of Atonement
Humankind falls into sin injured God's honor. Therefore, humankind must render satisfaction to a righteous God, but only God can make amends.

Did you know?
